THE PASTOR'S PAGE

Dear Friends:

If you've ever asked yourself, "What's wrong with the world?" you'd be in good company. The very question is the title of a 1910 book by the writer G.K. Chesterton, who was an odd figure for his time: an upper class English Catholic. His popularity stems from the much-beloved Father Brown novels, which even today are adapted as movies. Those of us who attended the seminary are familiar with Chesterton's more theological works: Orthodoxy, Heretics, Saint Francis of Assisi, and The Dumb Ox (the life of St. Thomas Aquinas). Chesterton was a passionate apologist for Catholicism, all while making his case with equal parts self-effacement and dry humor. Legend has it that the editor of the Times of London asked the famous writers of the time, "What is wrong with the world?" According to the Chesterton Society, he is known to have replied, "Dear Sir, I am. Yours, G.K. Chesterton." Ha! Only a genuinely humble person can be trusted with great questions like God, existence, life and death, good and evil, and all the rest. According to Wikipedia, Chesterton admired but sharply criticized two of the greatest wits of his time: Oscar Wilde and George Bernard Shaw. He rejected Wilde's pessimistic hedonism because for Chesterton, the hope of heaven is true realism. (One thing Wikipedia does *not* mention is that Wilde embraced the Church in his last days, finding in it the peace and joy that had eluded him in life.) Likewise, Chesterton repudiated many of Shaw's most deeply held convictions, among them "progressivism" and eugenics. The first amounts to a kind of contempt for the human condition and the weakness and limitation it implies. Shaw also championed the idea, quite popular at the time, that certain races were inherently superior to others. (Sounds familiar?) Sad to say: unlike Wilde, Shaw never considered the Christian message for himself. Strange, isn't it, that popular doctrines diminishing human dignity keep popping up throughout history? Civilization has perhaps always felt the lure of pleasure, and panicked in the face of pain or sacrifice. But from my perch, I've also noticed that when human beings—imperfect as they may be—refuse to conform to dehumanizing policies and practices that are presently being foisted upon society, that they are deemed "less than": intelligent, moral, even human...

All of which leads to Chesterton's famous quote from his book. He writes: "The Christian ideal has not been tried and found wanting. It has been found difficult, and left untried." Amen. Let's face it: the Gospel asks nothing less than everything from us. Jesus tells the rich young man: "If you want to be perfect, go and sell all you have and give the money to the poor; you have riches in heaven. Then come and follow me." Now of course it would wrong to read the Scriptures literally, or at least every time. (Parents would be negligent not to see to the temporal needs of their families.) Still, when an individual allows the full force of the gospel to dictate the course of one's life...the result is nothing short of miraculous. One such individual is the founder of western monasticism, St. Antony of the Desert, the 3rd-century "rich young man" who took the challenge of the Lord seriously, renouncing a life of luxury, and seeking God through a life of poverty, prayer, work. His denial of riches appears to have served him the way blindness sharpens a person's other senses. He retained every bit Scripture so that books became unnecessary; his battles against demonic forces attest to his utter reliance upon God; and his attention to the movements of the heart made him a master of the spiritual life, whose knowledge benefitted people from all backgrounds. We Catholics know that the Christian life is difficult, but we have also experienced the blessings that accrue to it. Let us pray to St. Antony that we may be equal to the task—and the glory—of Christian discipleship. Faithfully,





THE PASTOR'S PAGE

Dear Friends:

"Is Jesus Christ the Son of God?" [thinks] God: Jesus was my son. Buddha was my son. Mohammed. Moses. You. The man who said there was no room in the inn was my Son. And so is the one who charges eleven dollars for a steak. [Oh, God! (1977), starring George Burns]

Cute word game, no? By the same logic, thirty minutes with commercials is all you need to understand the meaning of life, reconcile enemies, comfort widows, and guide teenagers through adolescence. Yet celebrities preach endless, nonsensical sermons about "morality" with a fanaticism worthy of the Spanish Inquisition. They've got it backwards. The Old Testament prophet Micah (6:8), distinguishing true religion from its pagan counterpart, tells us: "You have been told, O man, what is good, and what the Lord requires of you: only to do the right and to love goodness, and to walk humbly with your God!" The modern version is: "Take God seriously, and don't take yourself too seriously." We should not limit God with our small ideas.

It demands a lot to explore the great questions of life; clever answers never satisfy us. This is particularly true when it comes to our relationship with God our Father. Today, the Church celebrates the Baptism of the Lord, when the crowd hears the Father speak directly to Jesus: "You are my Son; with you I am well pleased." OK, so Jesus is God's Son. But then isn't Buddha, or Mohammed, or you, the son (or daughter) of God? If so, the claim of Jesus' unique relationship to the Father becomes meaningless. So how do we approach the question?

The Catholic tradition, thank heaven, is rooted in the idea of analogy, according to which the same word enjoys various levels of meaning. This is how, e.g. we explain that things exist, but God is Existence. Likewise, then we say Jesus is God's "Son," we mean that everything God is, Jesus is: creator of the world, source of our existence, and the one in whom we have eternal life. We are not sons or daughters of God in this sense, for we do not possess the divine nature. Yet Jesus also shares in our human nature, which is why he could be born, grow, eat and drink, feel pleasure and pain, learn, and die just as we do. What is special about the Baptism of Christ is that, through him, believers receive the "Spirit of adoption, by which we cry, 'Abba, Father!'" (Rom. 8:15). Jesus is God's Son by nature, and we, by adoption. The same Holy Spirit that descended upon Jesus in the form of a dove is the same Spirit that animates the Church today, the Spirit that binds us to one another and to God. In the Mass for St. John the Baptist, we pray: "To make holy the flowing waters he baptized the very author of Baptism." Jesus blesses the waters of baptism so we may become the "children of God" (1 John 3:2).

Our artwork this week is Pietro Perugino's "Baptism of Christ" (1482) which resides in the Sistine Chapel. Notice that the central figure of the painting is the Holy Spirit. Catholics should remember that the Church is the Mystical Body of Christ, and that the Spirit is the bond of love between us. Let us pray that the Holy Spirit may anoint us as he does the Servant of God (Is. 42:1-4) to bring the good news of Christ to our world.

Faithfully, Fr. Valentine
