**READINGS FOR SUNDAY MARCH 13, 2022
SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT**

First Reading: Genesis 15: 5-12, 17-18

Second Reading: Philippians 3: 17 - 4:1 or 3: 20 - 4:1

Gospel: Luke 9: 28b-36

FOCUS: The Lord is my light and my salvation.

The Lord is my light and my salvation - whom should I fear?

The psalmist writes that his heart speaks of him, and his eyes look for him. The Lord is his helper who awaits him in the land of the living where he shall see his bounty. This psalm of praise complements each of our readings today: in the promise to Abraham, the words of Saint Paul, and the shining vision of Christ's glorified body. All of these Scriptures witness to the Good News we have been given, that the Lord is indeed our refuge and we have nothing to fear.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

The Lord promises Abram descendants, numerous as the stars, and then makes a covenant with him in which certain land will be given to his descendants. In the second reading, Saint Paul writes that *our citizenship is in heaven*, encouraging his listeners to stand firm in Christ. In the Gospel, Jesus is transfigured, revealing his glory to Peter, John, and James.

THE PASTOR'S PAGE

Dear Friends:

You might have read that the United Nations has directed its communications office not to use the terms “war” and “invasion” when referring to the continuing attack on Ukraine. Lest one “offend” a superpower, the UN uses other language to avoid the “risk” to its reputation for impartiality. Notice the reluctance to call something by its name, as though doing so were to editorialize or—horrors!—to pass moral judgment. As a native English speaker, I’m reasonably certain that war is “armed conflict between two states.” Let’s face it: what is happening in Ukraine is war, and with it comes the inevitable loss of human life. We must reckon with this. The deliberate taking of innocent human life is always sinful, and so, at least for Christians, this presents an enormous moral problem. But there’s the rub: there are individuals for whom war is *not* a problem. Some, like Carl von Clausewitz, call war “politics by other means”; it is simply the way things are. According to the argument, the world owes its very existence to opposing forces: dualities in tension with each other. Whether the male/female dynamic that brings about life, the counterweights that make elevators move up and down, the tension in strings that produces music, or the broken eggs that make the omelet, conflict and violence make the world go ’round. It follows that a world without war is a self-contradiction, much like a square circle. There might be some merit to this position, were it possible to equate human beings—created in the image and likeness of God—with inanimate objects like strings, and weights, and eggs. But people are not these things; they are of inestimable value, and are never to be used as pawns in a game of chess. The utilitarian/instrumentalist ethic is inconsistent with human dignity.

The paradox of grace is that almighty God is sovereign over all things, whether natural forces or human history. While the mystery of free will allows for the possibility that people will misuse it—terribly—freedom also throws into sharp relief the “efficacious” grace that moves the will to compassion. To wit: Poland has already given sanctuary to over a million refugees, while hundreds of thousands more have been welcomed into Hungary, Slovakia, and Romania. Right here at St. Mary’s, parishioners contributed over \$6,000.00, on one Sunday at a moment’s notice, to suffering Ukrainians. While not surprised, I am still amazed at your generous love.

This week the Church honors St. Cyril of Jerusalem (315-386), who suffered to defend the Church’s teaching on the divinity of Christ against the Arians, who taught that Jesus was simply a creature. Were it not for individuals like Cyril, our faith would not have been clarified. St. John Henry Newman reminds us: “No doctrine is defined until it is violated.” This would be an example of how grace brings about a beautiful synthesis: Christ is true God *and* true Man. We even learn to appreciate our “challengers” for helping us arrive at the truth. St. Thomas writes:

We must love them both, those whose opinions we share and those whose opinions we reject. For both have labored in the search for truth and both have helped us in the finding of it.

Let us pray for peace, and for the ability to speak the truth in love, even when it is difficult.
