Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

As far back as the ancient world, the concept of "right" (dextra) and "left" (sinistra) have been charged with contradictory meanings. A dexterous person, for instance, is thought to be sophisticated, shrewd, nimble, and quick, whereas a sinister person is devious, malevolent, and mischievous. Wherever did such associations arise? For one thing, only a small minority (15%) of people is left-handed, and therefore the exception to the rule: or put in other terms, suspicious. It's not necessarily a comfort for us to know that some of the world's greatest artistic geniuses (Leonardo da Vinci, Michelangelo, Mozart... and Lady Gaga) are southpaws. Whether there is any evidence for such prejudice, or simply accepted bias, it does lead to certain annoying and amusing results. Sr. Rosalie despaired of my handwriting in no small measure due to the fact that the ink from my cartridge pen always smeared on the page, as well as my white sleeves. Try finding a left-handed desk, or scissors, or spiral notebooks, and you get the picture. One can live with all that, but consider weightier matters, like the afterlife. The secular world understood the location of hell as "down" and "to the left." By contrast, the Old and New Testaments—and the Creed—state that paradise is located "up" and to "the right hand of God." This, of course, brings us to the mystery of the Lord's Ascension into heaven.

The Catholic celebration of the Ascension neutralizes any enmity between left and right, human and divine, matter and spirit, time and eternity. Fr. Rahner tells us: "The Ascension is a festival of the future of the world. The flesh is redeemed and glorified..." That's just the point: there is no war between the human and the divine. God simply descends to the human family to bring us back to heaven. Catholics should live in joyful anticipation of the Kingdom of Heaven not because God's creation is evil, but because it stands in need of perfection. In fact, the Ascension is the affirmation of the partnership we enjoy with God. Jesus rises to the Father on the basis of his divinity, but it is his human nature that rises to the Father. This is where we come in: because he is God, Jesus can save us, and because he is human, he chooses to take us with him.

This idea is beautifully expressed in this week's artwork: The Ascension of Christ [from the Benedictional of St Æthelwold (c. 971–984)]. You will notice that Jesus' head is surrounded by the divine nimbus, while his body is enveloped in the almond-shaped mandorla. Our wonderful medieval illumination is dynamic, in two senses. First, we notice that, unlike other depictions of the Ascension that have angels hoisting Our Lord to heaven, in this picture he is actively making his way to the Father. This indicates his divine nature. At the same time, Calum Cockburn of the British Library points out that Jesus reaches around with his right hand to grasp the right hand of his Father, who in turn lifts him up to heaven. Even the movement of his robes indicates Jesus' solidarity with the human family, who are subject to movement and change.

As always, Our Lady is front and center of the action, at the point where heaven and earth meet. As our dear parish celebrates 150 years of grace and love and goodness today, let us rededicate ourselves to the Mother of God, who saw all things through the eyes of faith.




