Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

“Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor...” Who said this? A Bible-waving TV evangelist? A sanctimonious pope? A pampered celebrity? Actually, these are the opening words of President George Washington’s “Thanksgiving Proclamation of 1789.” What strikes me is the president’s complete lack of embarrassment at invoking God in a civic proclamation, in what was—and is—the most religiously diverse nation the world has ever known. No doubt, many today would dismiss his message and replace it with an anemic, secular platitude. But if to thank is to thank *someone*, then where exactly should we direct our gratitude? “To Whom It May Concern”? Faith in a providential God was, for our forbears, the basis of our freedom, for which many sacrificed their lives.

Last week I mentioned the Catholic philosopher Charles Taylor’s idea that until very recently,

God was present (in public life) in a whole host of social practices ... when the only modes in which the society in all its components could display itself to itself were religious feasts, like, for instance, the Corpus Christi procession. In those societies, you couldn’t engage in any kind of public activity without “encountering God”...

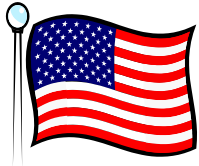
Taylor shares Washington’s assumption that even secular events are guided by the loving hand of God. Human beings, it follows, must subordinate themselves to his will, for only God sees the big picture, not to mention its destiny. Faith, then, is more than simply the acknowledgement that God exists, but the conviction that we are accountable to him.

Twentieth-century Christian thinkers, Protestant as well as Catholic, take the same view. Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the famous German Lutheran pastor, sought refuge in the U.S. during World War II. After being inspired by the vibrant faith he witnessed among the Black Churches in New York City, he returned to Germany and died in a concentration camp in the waning days of the war. In his book, *Religionless Christianity*, he argues that modern people have largely dismissed Christianity from public life. They reduce religious faith to an emotional escape from real human problems. In this climate, God has virtually no relevance to the way they live, individually or collectively. And so, in times of injustice or suffering, when human wisdom or technology fails, people look to God as a panacea, but wonder why they find no comfort. Bonhoeffer asserts, along with Washington and Taylor, that God must be a regular part of public life. People of faith do not see God as a crutch in times of adversity; on the contrary, we face God as mature people in a “world come of age.”

In dealing with our friends who lack the gift of faith (about 19% in a recent Gallup poll), we do well to maintain our sense of humor and keep up the dialogue. (How else will they learn?!) We simply remember that a world without God is not freer: just a lot smaller. Happy July 4th!



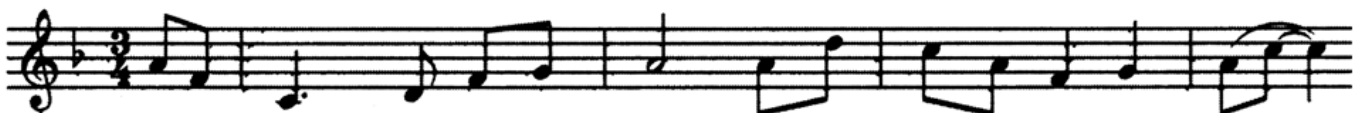

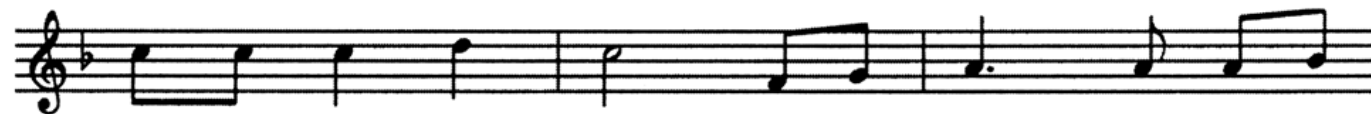
