31st Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Wisdom 11:22 - 12:2
 Second Reading: Thessalonians 1:11 - 2:2
 Gospel: Luke 19:1 -10

FOCUS: Receive the Lord with joy and be ready for change.

Zacchaeus was not looking for a miracle; he just wanted to see Jesus. When Jesus called him, he came down quickly with great joy. When Jesus calls us, do we come quickly, or do we hesitate? Jesus comes to us in the Eucharist. As Zacchaeus did, we ought to receive him with great joy. For Zacchaeus received Jesus and was changed by the encounter. We, too, are meant to be transformed, for the sake of the world.

LITURGY OF THE WORD: The author of the Book of Wisdom praises God for his love for all things he created and for the mercy he has on all people. Paul tells the Thessalonians that they always pray for them, that God may make [them] worthy of [their] calling. In the Gospel, Jesus calls Zacchaeus to come down from the tree, and the tax collector says he will give half his possessions away and repay what he owes anyone four times over.

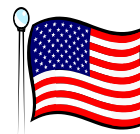

The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

In another life, I remember attending a conference featuring Fr. Bryan Hehir, a Harvard Professor of the Practice of Religion and Public Life. Fr. Hehir outlined for us the sweep of American Catholic History, from its humble beginnings to its present state. He pointed out that the Catholic Church arrived on our shores as an outsider, relegated to the margins of social, cultural, political, and economic life. Over the course of three centuries, Catholics made steady progress within all areas of American culture, and now occupy a central place among the most influential actors in public life. And yet, we Catholics are a unique bunch. While many have “made it” into the center of contemporary society, we still are to be found at those same margins we occupied from the beginning, and everywhere in between the two. This poses an ethical challenge to those who wield power to work for the progress of marginalized people—whether Catholic or not—so that all Americans may enjoy the rights enumerated in our founding documents: life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. It occurs to me that this earthly, “horizontal” vision of the church coexists with a “vertical” vision of what the Catholic Catechism calls the “three states of the Church”: the Church Militant (on earth), Suffering (in purgatory), and Triumphant (in heaven).

This week the Church commemorates All Saints Day to honor all holy men and women throughout history, both known and unknown, and All Souls Day, to pray for the souls of all the faithful departed. These celebrations have as their center the mystery we proclaim every Sunday: the Church, one, holy, catholic, and apostolic. One, because nothing, not even death itself, can divide those who have been redeemed by Christ; holy, because in baptism, Christians have been sanctified by the power of his Cross; catholic, because this communion embraces people from all times and places; and apostolic, that is, founded upon the faith of the apostles. We know that “the Church” is a reality that far exceeds the conventional notion of a building, or the leadership of a corporation. While from a secular perspective, it is the largest and most diverse institution in history, it is far more than that; it transcends the limits of time and space, to include those who “have died and are being purified, while still others are in glory, contemplating ‘in full light, God himself triune and one, exactly as he is.’” (The Council of Florence [1439])

The doctrine of Purgatory is not meant to frighten or scandalize Christians; on the contrary, it gives us hope. The Church acknowledges that, while God forgives our sins, the real-world injury we have caused still remains. Whence arises that injury? In Dante’s *Purgatorio*, we learn that love—whether ordered (holy) or disordered (sinful)—is at the heart of our actions.

“Thus you may understand that love alone
is the true seed of every merit in you,
and of all acts for which you must atone.”

The souls in Purgatory must reckon with their disordered loves in order to be prepared for the glories of heaven. Our prayers and sacrifices, and the merits of the saints, demonstrate the Church’s solidarity as we await the triumph of Christ over death, humanity’s final enemy.
