The Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

One of the great joys here at St. Mary's is going to visit the old folks at Sun Harbor Nursing Home. As a rule, the people are not given to loquacious pronouncements, but when they have something to say, they speak with great conviction. This past week as we prepared for Mass, we discussed the practice of the Church, particularly during November, of honoring the saints and praying for the souls in Purgatory. They asked me if I knew any saints and, off the top of my head, I mentioned a dear priest friend and mentor, who I truly believe, is the essence of a saint. But then I thought: in the future, perhaps the Church might look to honor as saints more lay people, mothers and fathers especially, who bring new life into the world and into the Church. As the Religious Ed students and I agreed, parents' love is the kind of love most like God's. Why? Because their love is directed wholly toward the welfare of their children, without expectation of repayment. This brought up a lively discussion of our parents. One resident said that she was one of seven brothers and sisters; another said her mother had eight; another twelve. Lastly, a lady won the competition: her mother had *sixteen* children. Funny coincidence: every woman reported that her mother's earliest desire was to become: a nun! The social director at the home, a lovely Jewish lady, added: "boy, now there's a saint!"

Odd, isn't it, that the desire to devote oneself utterly to God in a formal, public way such as religious life ultimately manifests itself in the vocation of marriage and family life? Some might think of the two callings as inconsistent with each other. Are they really? As a Catholic priest—and one of Betty Valentine's "only" seven children—I agree with Martin Luther (!) that "ordinary" actions, when done with faith in God, can be holy. Not everyone is called to this particular life, and so the array of vocations in Catholicism (clergy, religious, and lay) all come from the same passionate love for Christ. The Fathers of the Second Vatican Council remind us: "Therefore in the Church, everyone whether belonging to the hierarchy, or being cared for by it, is called to holiness." Everyone, that is, not just the public representatives of the Church. One might argue that in terms of sheer charity, the People of God always outrun their pastors.

This week, the Church honors St. Margaret of Scotland (1046-1093) daughter of aristocratic Hungarian parents; her uncle was St. Stephen of Hungary. According to the Catholic Encyclopedia, when the Normans conquered England, her widowed mother Agatha decided to return to Hungary, but because of bad weather on the sea, they sought safe harbor in Scotland and protection from King Malcolm III; he eventually married her after being "put off" for several years due to Margaret's desire to enter the convent. She bore him eight children—in itself an act of heroism!—but this did not dampen her zeal for the Kingdom of God. She worked to reform lay piety, including the Lenten fast and Easter communion, while encouraging rules that govern marriage to protect all parties. She founded monasteries and churches, one of which guarded a relic of the true Cross. Her jewel-encrusted Book of the Gospels (yes, Catholics *do* read the Scriptures!) is now located at Oxford's Bodleian Library. Finally, she was a person of deep devotion and prayer at the service of God's poor. Imagine what deeds we can accomplish, whatever our state in life, when fueled by the love of God.

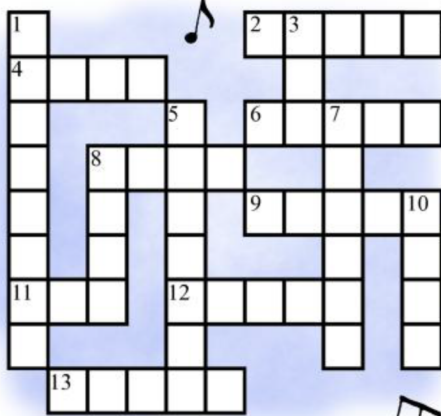

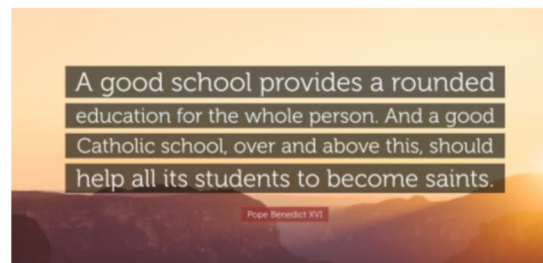
