Dear Friends:

One of my favorite lessons with my students is Plato's "Allegory of the Cave," in which the philosopher distills many of his thoughts regarding education, politics, and the "love of the Good." (A Christian might replace "Good" with "God.") The point is that the lover of wisdom finds his greatest joy in contemplating heavenly things, not material gain. Indeed, authority over others is as nothing compared to the pursuit of knowledge. The irony, however, is that though the philosopher king must be dragged "kicking and screaming" into leadership over others, he turns out to be the best ruler, precisely because he keeps his eye on what matters most.

This year, on the day before the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, the Church honors St. Ambrose, Bishop and Doctor. If ever there was a figure in ecclesiastical history who serves as a Christian counterpart to the philosopher-king described above, it was he. Born in 340 AD to an aristocratic family in what is now Germany, he set off to a career in law and public service. According to the *Catholic Encyclopedia*, his eloquence and persuasiveness earned him the attention of the Christian Emperor, Valentinian, who subsequently appointed him governor in Liguria, with its capital in Milan. He tried to quell the public—and violent—quarrelling between Catholics and Arians, a powerful heretical sect supported by the wife of the Emperor. Trusted by both sides, Ambrose, still only a catechumen, was elected bishop of Milan, and within a week was baptized and consecrated bishop; he then gave away all his possessions. Realizing that his theological training was lacking, he immersed himself in the scriptures and classical literature. His knowledge of Greek helped him communicate with the Eastern Fathers, specifically St. Basil; the fruit of their respectful dialogue, it has been suggested, might have prevented the future schism. Of the need for an educated clergy, he writes:

I only desire to attain to that knowledge of the sacred writings, which the Apostle has placed last amongst the duties of the saints...so that, in trying to teach, I may be able to learn. For one is the true Master, Who alone has not learned, what He taught all; but men learn before they teach, and receive from Him what they may hand on to others.

In a mixture of courage and gentleness, the staunchly Catholic bishop defended the lives of the Arians regardless of their views, and, when the new Roman Emperor, Theodosius, slaughtered thousands of his subjects, Ambrose refused him entrance to the Basilica in Milan until he humbled himself and performed a public penance. Nevertheless, Ambrose received him kindly back into the fold, and was at his bedside when he died. Theodosius was to have said of him, "I know no bishop worthy of the name, except Ambrose."

The Saint wrote voluminously and cared for souls. His illustrious convert was Augustine, who stands with him—and Basil—holding the "Throne of St. Peter" in the Vatican Basilica. As for our Lady's Immaculate Conception, Ambrose was one of the earliest advocates of the mystery. He writes in the person of Jesus: "Come... receive Me in that flesh which fell in Adam. Receive Me not from Sara, but from Mary, a virgin incorrupt; a virgin by grace; entirely free from every stain of sin." ("On Psalm 118") May we imitate Ambrose's blend of wise faith, hope, and love.
